What are some early experiences that have shaped your career?

(Roy) At the age of five I took six months of piano lessons from my grandmother. I stopped because of farm work and schoolwork overload. However, she painted this wonderful picture that I could be a great pianist if I studied and had a good teacher. We lived on a farm, and there was no extra money for maintaining a piano. Our farm truck had a bed on it for harvesting hay in the summer. It was changed to a wooden people box and functioned as a school bus for my two room, 7 grade school in the Winter. My poor grandmother kept telling me through my teenage years what a great pianist I could be.

How did Carillon Music come to be?

We started in 1970 selling pianos, home organs, and teaching the Yamaha Music School program for children 4 to 8 years of age. It was based on children developing most of their ear's tonal definition in that age. Most piano teachers did not want to teach children who could not read. In a few years we had around 400 children in that age group, coming to us from Bellingham, Blaine, Abbotsford, plus locals. We added private piano lessons, pop organ lessons and in 1980 also classical organ. After several years we separated from Yamaha and "North Americanized" our children's programs.

Tell me about the Carillon Music Summer Institute. How did it emerge?

In 1987 we became concerned about pianists playing organ with little, or no training. Many did not use the pedalboard, didn't understand registration, and couldn't improvise. We brought in wonderful international organists as teachers for the four day CMSI workshop. Its simple goal was to motivate these pianists to expand their organ knowledge. In the 1980's-90's we had between 30-40 students. The Summer Institute is held for four days in August each year. Of recent years we have added scholarships to cover the tuition costs for piano students to experience organ. The students are encouraged to pick a song of their choosing and ability, and prepare it for the final concert from what they learn. The piano students are introduced to the organ as an exciting instrument to add to their talents when they finish piano. This has been a very successful program as there are now a number of CMSI program students who are either taking organ lessons as they finish piano and/or are now playing at churches.

Building such a program takes commitment and long range vision.

Yes indeed. And organs have also changed so much in the last few years. Sampled sound has been used and was very good. Sampled sound is like taking a photograph of the sound.

Physical modeling of sound has been introduced now, and it mathematically, more accurately captures the breathing, impulses, and tones that create the breath of life found in a fine pipe organ. I listen very carefully to every pipe organ I come in contact with to better understand how to incorporate its sounds and how it works with acoustics. I have learned a fine digital organ installation is more of a process than an event.

You have a passion for good hymn playing.

Yes, and hymn culture is quite different now than it was 20 years ago. Some music is musically marginal and some very good. So much new music comes out every week that groups hardly have time to learn it before they move on to another new song. The well-known hymn writer Fanny Crosby wrote over 8000 hymns, but only a small percentage survived the test of time. The same is true for contemporary hymns. Singing is when corporate worship can take place, and the more inspirational it is the more meaningful it is. A hymn sing once a month is a great way to sing the old and new together and enjoy what works best with which instruments or midi sounds or worship band.

Are there favourite hymns that have shaped your life?

The standard favorites of “How Great Thou Art” and “It Is Well” are there. At this point in time “My Soul Has Found a Resting Place” currently meets my needs. Hymnary has been a huge influence for me as I move from one favorite to another, depending on my spiritual or emotional need at any point in time!

You have non-musical interests as well. You’re a helicopter pilot.

Oh yes. My dad bought me an airplane ride when I was seven. It was terrifyingly exciting! It also set my eyes on my future occupation. I purchased my first airplane when I was 16 for \$600, an Aeronca Champion, 65hp with a wooden propeller. My father and I both got our flying licences in it. I flew that plane around until I turned it upside down in a cow pasture, then, at 19 years of age I traded it in for the helicopter course. Helicopter pilots were in high demand in Canada, so I first flew in 1958-59-61 summers for Highland Helicopter in Canada and permanently moved to Canada in 1963. I flew the helicopter for close to 20 years for mainly Falconbridge Nickel Mines looking for mines. It started out on Vancouver Island and worked north up the coast mountain ranges to Alaska and through Alaska to the root of the Aleutian Islands. Being a helicopter pilot was great because we spent a lot of time in wilderness areas with wildlife, which I enjoyed very much. My wife Frieda and the children came north in summer and she became the Camp Cook . She’s been a wonderful partner in life and the business. Like myself, she was raised on a farm. It was rare to be in a village or camp that had a piano, but when we did find one - no matter how far out of tune, it was music to my ears!

What are your tips for success?

Perseverance is the powerful secret of success, and being excited about what you do, whether it’s about each day’s opportunities, or a new piece music.

★ Pipe Organ Spotlight

The feature for this newsletter is the organ at **Queens Avenue United Church in New Westminster**, which will be heard in two concerts this autumn.

Built in 1959 by Casavant Frères, it is an early example of the new neoclassical style, which Artistic and Tonal Director Lawrence Phelps introduced to Casavant in the late 1950s.
